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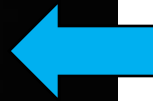

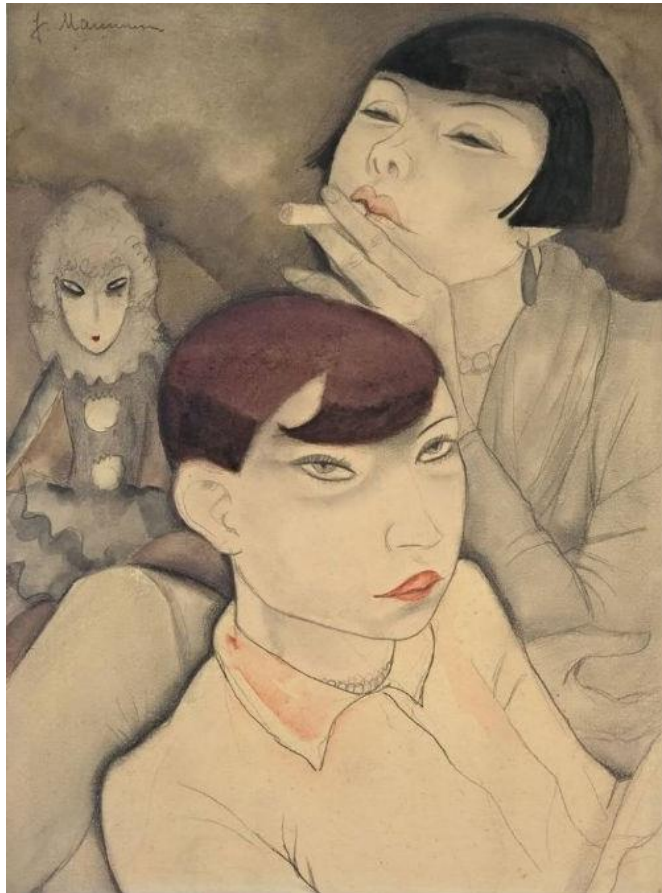

## Jeanne Mammen

1890-1976

German artist Mammen was an active member of Berlin's LGBTQ+ social and artistic scene. She worked illustrating magazines, but also made watercolours and When her artwork of women was displayed at a 1933 exhibition, Nazi officials interrupted the event and deemed Jeanne's work as "degenerate" and "Jewish." She was forced to revert back to advertising and abandon the leverage she had been making as a distinctly lesbian artist.





## Hannah Gluckstein - painter

1895-1978

This British artist defied gender norms in dress and names, preferring to be known only as 'Gluck'. Gluck painted portraits, landscapes and flowers and refused to belong to any particular art movement or style.

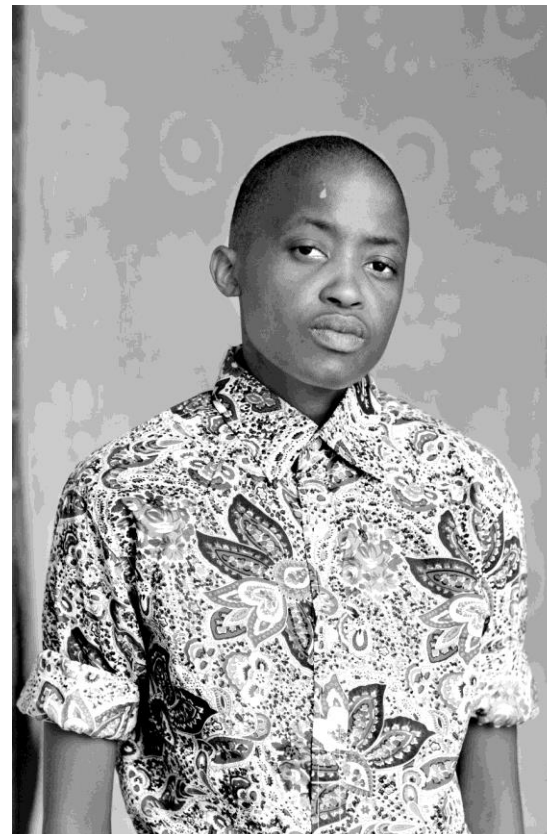
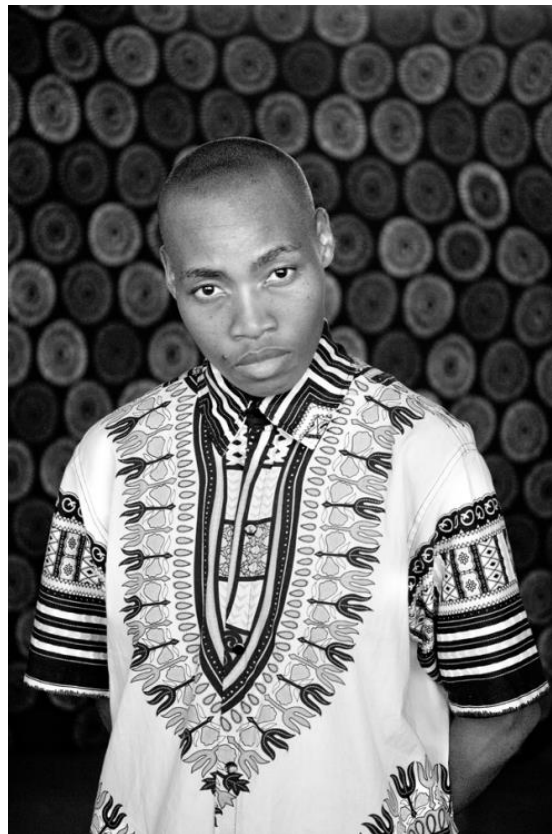


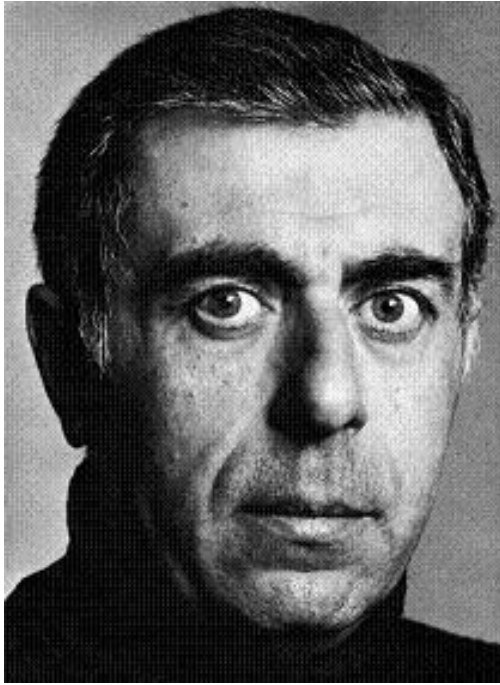


## Zanele Muholi – photographer

1972 - present

Muholi is a non-binary artist from South Africa. Muholi describes themselves as a visual activist. From the early 2000s, they have documented and celebrated the lives of South Africa's black lesbian, gay, trans, queer and intersex communities. Muholi describes the people in the portraits they create as participants not subjects.

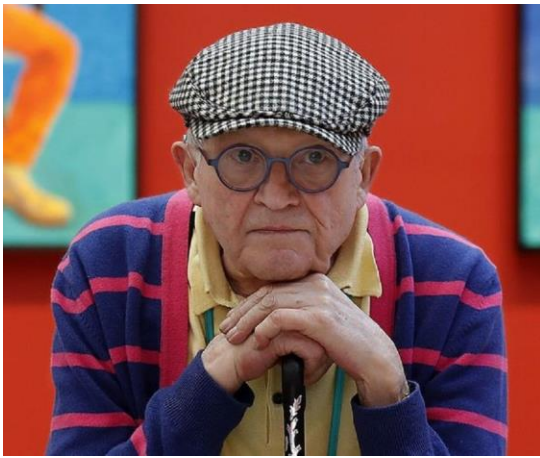




Bahman Mohasses – painter, sculptor, theatre director  
1931-2010

Mohasses was an Iranian gay artist, working in multiple disciplines. Mohasses left his home country of Iran when the Government started to censor his artworks due to his sexuality. He destroyed many of his artworks, the remaining ones are rare and very valuable.





## David Hockney- Painter

1937-present

David Hockney is one of the most celebrated and established LGBTQ+ artists still working today. Hockney has long been recognised for his playful, pop-primitivist works, combining cubism with a cartoonish flair to create tender depictions of queer domestic life.
